When she was 15 years old, Bibi and her family came to the United States from Malaysia. She spoke no English when she arrived. She was enrolled at Bradley Tech High School, and through her English As A Second Language (ESL) courses, she quickly became a top student there, landing on the Honor Roll during her Junior and Senior years. She became a Bradley Tech Student Leader helping other ESL students, and was a member of Bradley Tech's Debate Team and Tennis program. In the summer, Bibi also was a participant in Employ Milwaukee's summer youth program, Earn & Learn!

As a Bi-Lingual Community Health Worker, Bibi will be working with community members on COVID-19 prevention, mitigation, testing, vaccination, and community resource linkages. "Bibi speaks Rohingya and Malay, so she will be a great help to us in serving that immigrant and refugee community," said Kai Mishlove, Bibi's Supervisor and the Program Coordinator of Refugee Health Services at Aurora Walker's Point Community Clinic.
